

Message from the Manse



The Secret Diary of Adrian Mole, aged 13 ³/₄ by Sue Townsend, set in the early 1980s gives a very unflattering portrayal of Glasgow. On holiday in Scotland with his Mum, Adrian's entry on Wednesday 26 August 1981, made as they drive into the city, speaks of drunks, barbed wire and broken glass. He is impressed, however, with 'Salvador Dali's painting of the Crucifixion!!!'. 'One day I will take Pandora to see it,' he writes. 'Perhaps on our honeymoon.'

While Sue Townsend might have been a bit harsh on Glasgow all those years ago, nowadays holidaymakers to Glasgow will have a completely different, and far more positive, experience. And looking back, the turning point it seems to me was the Glasgow Garden Festival of 1988 – 30 years ago this year! Wasn't it wonderful! Since when, among all sorts of other occasions when we've had cause to be extremely proud of our city, we've been EU City of Culture, UK City of Design and Architecture, and hosted the Commonwealth Games.

One of the highlights for me, I remember, on the Garden Festival site itself was the beautiful little glass chapel which, by way of a contrast to the roller coaster (and I can even recall trying out scuba diving in an enormous tank – not in the River Clyde!), was such a peaceful place. It was also somewhere that was genuinely ecumenical and interfaith at a time when these virtues were far less common than they are today.

All faiths revering gardens as places of prayer. And, indeed, our own scriptures both beginning and ending in gardens: the Garden of Eden in Genesis, and then in Revelation the Garden of God. Elsewhere in the New Testament God is described by Jesus as a gardener, and then after the resurrection Mary Magdalen mistakes Jesus for a gardener **himself**.

As we look forward to summer, let's also look back over the past 30 years, and whenever we're able to get out and about and spend time in gardens and parks around our city, and our country-side too, give thanks.
